Travel


All the party will be travelling by coach.

AN INTRODUCTION TO THE ROYAL FOREST OF DEAN

The Forest of Dean is one of the most fascinating regions of England, and its isolation by two great rivers, the Severn and the Wye and the hilly nature of its terrain having preserved a pattern of life and land use different from that found in the rest of Gloucestershire.

It has the distinction of being a Royal Forest in which some of the local population have the rights to dig for minerals.

From time immemorial man has lived within the confines of the Forest of Dean; evidence of prehistoric man has been found in King Arthur's cave in Lords Wood, flints and remains of extinct animals have been estimated to go back to the year 80,000 B.C. Small camps of undetermined date are to be seen at Soudley, English Bicknor, Welshbury and Littledean. Defensive earthworks on promontories exist at Symonds Yat, Lancaut and Lydney Park.

During the Roman occupation the Forest was extensively mined for iron ore and some of the workings of this and later date, locally known as "Scowles" are picturesque, though somewhat dangerous to the incautious. A short stretch of the Dean Roman Road is preserved at Blackpool Bridge near Blakeney. This road ran from Lydney to Mitcheldean and was constructed during the 1st and 2nd centuries. In Saxon times "Offa's Dyke" (circa 780 A.D.) was built to keep the Celts at bay and a portion of this can still be seen at Tidenham and Symonds Yat.

Later the Forest was a favourite hunting ground for Norman Kings; Wild Boar and Deer abounded in plenty for the "Chase". At first timber was of value mianly for the preservation of game cover, but in the course of time acquired new importance for iron smelting and shipbuilding, and, as the coal mining industry developed, for pit work.

The end of the 18th century saw the beginning of an intense industrial drive in the Dean; and by 1900 something like a million tons of coal a year were being raised. Tramroads and later railways served every part of the district. But it was not to last. Even before the 1914 war the decline had begun and in the period which followed, the age old iron industry became a thing of the past; coal mines too lost ground and today no coal is raised in the Dean except for a few pits where Free Miners still exercise their ancient rights.

Since 1923 the Forest of Dean has been entrusted to the care of the Forestry Commission which has since been actively engaged in maintaining it as a modern scientifically managed forest of 27,000 acres, wherein both felling and replanting goes on year after year in order to maintain a perpetual yield of timber.

Hand in hand with these aims goes the management of the area as a Forest Park for the benefit of the many varied enjoyments of thousands of visitors each year.

Half of the total area of the Forest will be maintained in the traditional style, with oak, beech and other broadleaved trees. Here within a mile or so of some small town, or only a few yards from the main roads you may find that sylvan seclusion that the great woods alone can







BEAUFORT AVIARIES




See the world's rarest pheasants, set out in beautiful gardens commanding a view across some of the area's most attractive countryside.


WINNERS OF SYKES MEMORIAL TROPHY FOR 1983



Headquarters of Dean Forest Railway the Norchard Steam Centre has been built, and is operated by, volunteer railway enthusiasts on what was hitherto a long abandoned bramble infested old colliery site. It contains a large collection of full size railway locomotives. coaches and wagons, and is alongside the Lydney to Parkend Branch Line. There is a small station and 4/3rds of a mile of railway track where steam trains operate on many days throughout the year. It is intended to extend onto the adjacent branch line and eventually run trains over the whole 31/2 miles between Lydney and Parkend, the surviving remnant of a railway network which served all parts of the forest in its industrial past.
